## Teaching Experience

### Maryland Institute College of Art (Fall 2001-Present)

<u>Junior Independent GFA/Drawing:</u> (2011- Current)Students are assisted in developing a personal direction in any fine arts medium or combination of media. This course provides the opportunity to explore the initiation of a sustained body of work in preparation for the senior independent program.

<u>Photo as Muse:</u>(2011-2013) This new studio course emphasizes an interdisciplinary approach to art making by exploring ways in which contemporary artists use photography as part of their process. Over the course of the semester, students discuss artists that paint and draw from their photographs as well as artists that use photography to document performances such as temporal sculptures, body art, and narrative stage-sets. The course examines artists that use photography in collage and installation work.

#### Assistant to the Director of Mount Royal School of Art: (Fall 2002 - Spring 2003)

Liaison between students and the Director of the Mount Royal School of Art, Dennis Farber. I coordinated scheduling of, facility functions and maintenance, worked cooperatively with director and students to have needs and concerns dealt with effectively. Duties included coordinating the scheduling of program activities critiques with student body and facilitating the needs of artists in residence and visiting professionals including John Yau, Hermine Ford, Peter Rostovsky, Nicole Eisenman, Olav Westphalen and Saul Anton.

#### Studio Writing Advisor: (Fall 2002 - Spring 2003)

I scheduled studio visits with graduating seniors working on their thesis exhibitions to discuss and make observations about both their artwork and written statements. My objective was to help students to create a cohesive thesis by integrating the creation of artwork and the process of writing.

#### Video Instructor: (Fall 2001)

Working with Community Arts Partnership, an outreach program directed toward urban youth in Baltimore City, I offer students the opportunity to create Public Service Announcements of their own design by teaching camera operation, storyboarding, shooting, and editing with Final Cut Pro.

## Towson University (Fall 2006 to Present)

<u>Drawing I and Drawing for Non-Art Majors:</u> Introduce individuals to the fundamentals of drawing. In-class drawing exercises are supplemented with sketchbook assignments, longer homework drawing assignments, discussions and slide lectures. Emphasis is placed on the interdependency of form and content. Still life, Figure drawing, Landscape, Interiors, Composition, Portraiture are explored.

<u>Visual Concepts:</u> Multidisciplinary exploration of concept in artistic production; projects emphasizing the inextricable link between form and content. Introduction to conceptual issues in contemporary art and design. Students create projects, do readings and reflective writing, keep a vigorous sketchbook and research log and participate in critiques and discussions.

<u>Fundamentals of Design:</u> I developed a series of projects, lectures, writing assignments, and non-conventional, in-class activities to demonstrate the elements and principles of design. Individuals are introduced to collage, mono-printing, creation of stencils, drawing techniques, and digital media such as Photoshop. We discuss how craftsmanship, form, and media dictate content.

## University of Maryland in Baltimore County (Fall 2005- Spring 2015)

Ideas in the Arts: Students explore central issues in the visual and performing arts. The inter-relationships of essential elements in a work of art, including; process, technique, form, subject matter and content will be emphasized. The course also covers an examination of the arts in a larger context, from historical, cultural and theoretical perspectives. Students will discuss works drawn from the areas of dance, music, visual arts and theater.

<u>Contemporary Art in Practice:</u> In conjunction with the InterArts Series, students explore the possible interrelationships of the arts today. The series brings some of the most advanced and influential artists to the campus to present their work and discuss it's motives. Readings and discussions accompany.

## Anne Arundel Community College (Fall 2003 to Fall 2012)

<u>Fundamentals of Design:</u> I developed a series of projects, lectures, writing assignments, and in-class activities to demonstrate the elements and principles of design. Individuals are introduced to collage, mono-printing, creation of stencils, drawing techniques, and digital media such as Photoshop. We discuss how craftsmanship, form, and media dictate content.

<u>Drawing I, 2, and 3:</u> introduce individuals to the fundamentals of representational drawing while encouraging expression. In-class drawing exercises are supplemented with sketchbook assignments, longer homework drawing assignments, discussions and slide lectures. Emphasis is placed on the interdependency of form and content.

### Corcoran College of Art and Design

<u>Drawing I (Summer 2004)</u>: I was an instructor for a drawing and portfolio development course during an intensive summer program(Pre-College). Students received advice on strengthening and unifying their drawing portfolios.

Sculpture I (Summer 2003): Assisted students with concept development and the construction of projects of various media.
