Building an Inclusive Community One Conversation at a Time

Nonprofit organizations play a crucial role in building a better future for those in need. The <u>Circle of</u> <u>Friends</u> organization is driven by a mission to address social issues, provide support, and address the growing needs of adults with disabilities in Cherokee County, GA.

The Circle of Friends website outlines the organization's history and three cornerstone goals that define its purpose. In May 2019 a town hall was held at Hickory Flat United Methodist Church to discuss which support services (or lack thereof) were available for adults with Intellectual Development Disabilities (IDD). Guest speakers and 80 community members shared their experiences and knowledge of existing services and expressed their longing for more.

Young adults with IDD and their families completed a survey about needs and services in the community. The results of the town hall and Facebook-administered survey identified three top needs: Socialization, Supportive employment, and Supportive Affordable Housing. These goals guide the future of Circle of Friends.

Fast forward to 2024, two of three goals have been met, but the third goal, Supportive Affordable Housing remains steadfast on the Circle of Friends wishlist. Co-founders, Diane and Glenn Keen meet regularly with Cherokee County community members through ongoing fundraiser events and information-sharing forums. One such meeting occurred today where Diane and Glenn met with parents of children with IDD, people who work within the IDD care space, and Paul Seals a District Representative through Congressman Barry Loudermilk Georgia's 11th District office. Both Diane and Glenn shared the dreams and blueprint of their current project underway as well as the bigger picture for "an attainable, neuro-inclusive, living community for our friends with intellectual and developmental disabilities in Cherokee County, Georgia."

Flourish Cafe's larger space can accommodate hosting more activities and programming to provide much-needed socialization. In addition, the Flourish Cafe menu will include a bountiful beverage menu, light fare, fresh-made croissants, cookies, and eating options prepared by Flourish Cafe Manager Caira Stetson, an experienced French baker. Flourish Cafe will add more supportive employment opportunities for individuals with IDD.

By focusing on the well-being and empowerment of vulnerable populations, the Circle of Friends nonprofit works toward improving the quality of life for individuals with IDD and their families who face questions about their loved ones' futures.
