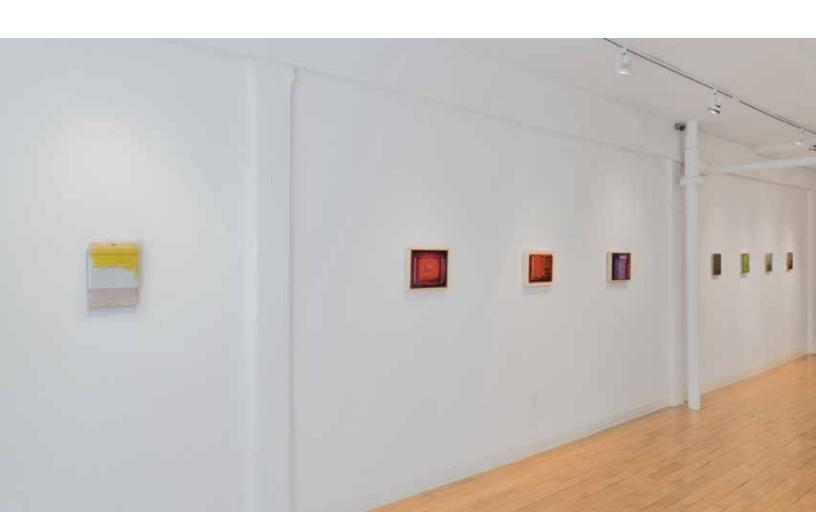
JENNIFER LISTON MUNSON Looking In + Looking Out

July 5-30, 2023

Jennifer Liston Munson's work in *Looking In + Looking Out* creates lenses for the viewer to look in and for the subjects themselves to look back out. Her selection of art objects, ghostly figures, and landscapes call into question historical collection practices, the complexity of narratives, and the notion of belonging. *Looking In + Looking Out* incorporates images of objects held in museum collections, photographs of unknown relatives, and abandoned historically significant interiors to examine the fragility of memory. In some of the pieces, Liston Munson makes the landscape the subject; spaces, trees, and enigmatic watery pools that remain while the bodies they contain dissolve to time, as layers of paint ooze from the edges to mark the art making process and the past. Color, translucency, and materiality combine to make space for intimate looking and allow for connections to the collective consciousness.

Jennifer Liston Munson is a Boston area artist who was born in New York and grew up in Los Angeles. She received an MFA from the School of the Museum of Fine Arts at Tufts University and a BFA from Massachusetts College of Art and Design. Jennifer studied painting at Loughborough College of Art and Design in England. She received a Traveling Scholar fellowship culminating with a show at the Museum of Fine Arts, Boston. Her work is held in private and corporate collections.

Jennifer teaches at the SMFA at Tufts University and has an exhibition design practice that focuses on place-making for historic and contemporary art objects in museums and galleries.





Alcázar Toledo, Spain

This piece is one of a series of paintings inspired by an extant room in the Alcázar of Toledo, Spain that is suspended in time. It was caught in the crossfire of the Spanish Civil War—bullet holes remain in the peeling wallpaper and the room—decaying architecture hangs upside down in the balance of then and now as a witness to history and as a metaphor for personal loss and suffering. Still, light shines through the tiny windows to allow for the possibility of renewal and change.



What Ghosts Are (In Black)



I was thinking about how early spirit photographers would sometimes touch the plates to summon unseen images. After re-photographing images of unknown relatives, I buried the prints in lucite blocks and hand-worked the surfaces to resurrect their trace—now as disembodied spirits—to create lenses to look into, and for them to look out through. They dwell in a fragile, abandoned past aware of the salience of mortality and perhaps as premonitions of a complex and unknown future. Layers of the past ooze from the edges to reveal hidden layers of color that is covered in shades of black that allow the image to appear through prolonged looking.



The Memory of Objects



As a museum worker, I have a deep and intimate history with extraordinary works of art across cultures and time. The connection is not only with the material piece, it is also with the makers, often unknown, who touched and formed the artifacts. During the pandemic, I thought about those art objects and artists I missed and imagined them alone in vitrines and storage boxes, away from their cultures of origin, without anyone to look in on them. I wanted to materialize the memory of those objects—to imagine them back into 3D forms again. The hand-worked resin surfaces create milky lenses for them to look out through and hold objects in suspended time to question historical collection practices, the legitimacy of ownership, the complexities of narratives, and the notion of belonging.



What Ghosts Are (Unknown Descendant)



This project began during the isolation of the Covid epidemic when I looked through a family photo album I had never seen. Images of faint figures clung to the paper and seemed to be caught between two worlds—simultaneously inhabiting an invisible past while communicating with me, their unknown descendant. These figures stood in the water and occupied the landscape to reveal intimate relationships with the unseen photographer and to the places they inhabited, which remain though they themselves have disappeared. The particulars of the individual are relinquished to look closely at long gone figures in the still present landscape.



Framed Light



Light, although unbuilt, plays a crucial part in defining how space is perceived. As much as light impacts architecture, architecture also impacts light. These images are rooted in Modernist architecture that allows framed light to enter interiors by carving voids from solids that create projections of abstract color.



Lightblocks

The opposite of monumental, these sculptures are miniature models of architecture that tell a story of a space through multiple vantage points of looking. Simple geometries allow light to pass through as the day changes. Images of art objects and places are buried in the layers—concealed and revealed through colored light lenses.



Looking Through Lenses

These little lenses are meant to look through. They can be handled to see something in a new way—maybe just light and color, maybe unseen ghosts.

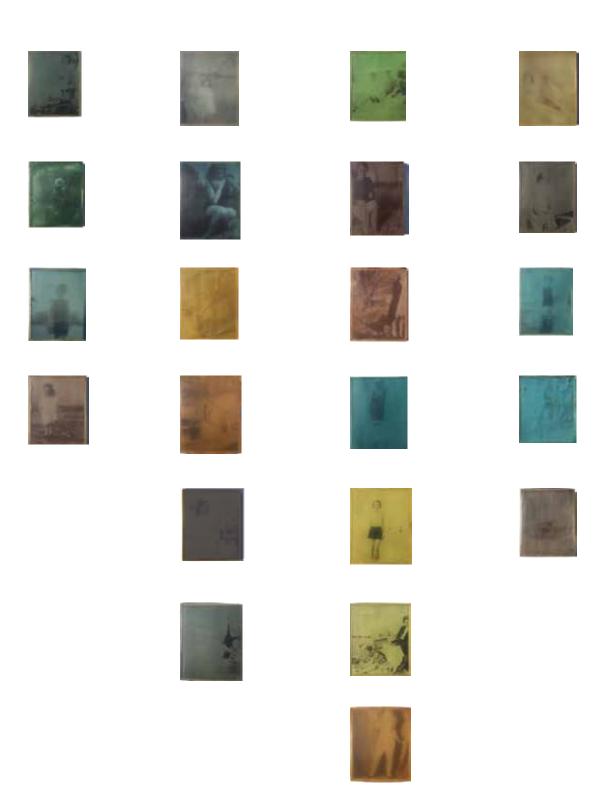

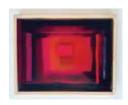
30 Framed Light (Red), 2023
