Technology	 Very little technology will be used in this lesson. iPads will be available for research, but students will be expected to formulate their own plans and responses to the provided objects without external research. 	
Instructional Plan for the Lesson	 10 minutes: Lesson introduction: Does anyone collect things? My son likes to collect cool rocks he finds. Have you ever found something that you weren't quite sure what it was, but you liked it and kept it? What does it mean to respond to something? Today, we are going to use Objects I found (Found Objects) to make art. Then, we are going to give them to the 7th graders later today, and they will make a larger sculpture or sculptures. Do artists work alone? What does it mean to collaborate? It means to work together toward a common goal. Using only the objects at your tables, work in teams to create a sculpture. The point is to respond to the materials you have without a plan. Work together, talk, and share ideas so that you work collaboratively to create something new and unique. 15 minutes, studio work 5 minutes, "gallery walk" students walk around the room and view what their peers are doing. 10 minutes, studio work 10 minutes clean up 5 minutes carpet time/review/reflection
